Canadian Eggs in England.

Six.—Annexed I hand you an extract from the Grocers' Gazette, published in London, England, under date 6th inst.

"Canadian Eggs.—The efforts to establish an export trade in Canadian eggs continues to excite a good deal of interest in Montreal.

Experts from Liverpool who have visited that centre are said to have expressed a very high estimate of Canadian crate eggs. It appears that the impression that most of the eggs in stock were sent into the United States before the McKinley act came into force was erroneous, as a large number of dealers, anticipating scarcity in the Canadian market, as a consequence of large exports by their neighbors, held back their stocks.
