The intense heat in Ontario is abating. The cold winters are depopulating Iceland.

Ex-Secretary of State Evans arrived Sunday from Europe. St. Paul and Minneapolis papers are full of the "great fair."

The defalcation of the Brooklyn board of education amounts to \$200,000. Hon. Mr. Blake addressed a public meeting in Quebec last night.

The City of Berlin brought \$1,574,000 in gold to New York yesterday. The Nihilist organ, "Will of the People," has made its reappearance in St. Petersburg.

The census of India has been completed, and shows a population of 252,500,000. Emperor Francis Joseph, of Austria, and King Humbert, of Italy, will meet in October.

Private advices from Sir John A. Macdonald report him feeling as well as ever. He has checked the bush fires in Ontario but they continue pretty bad in Ottawa and Guelph districts.

The Minneapolis Tribune announces the arrival of "His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales" at the show. Toronto regatta was postponed yesterday, on account of high winds. It will take place to-day if all is favorable.
