CANADIAN CURRENCY. The Montreal Patriotic Murder—Ottawa & Nelson How-Fatal Railway Accident—The Feebleys Liberated—Killed on the Track.

Ro. C. W. Patterson, incumbent of Trinity Church, at Aurora, is dead. At Montreal on Thursday, the jury in the case of Hugh Hayvern returned a verdict of wilful murder, and he was sentenced to death on December 9th.

John Blue, Jr., of Wallace town, was killed on the Canada Southern Railway track near Dutton Friday night. He is supposed to have jumped from the excursion train returning from the Southern Counties Fair.

On Monday a fatal accident occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway. An old lady, and an old resident, Mrs. James Bartram, was killed by the up special at the railroad bridge, at Bowmanville station. She was crossing the bridge. The conductor whistled down down brakes, but too late.

On Thursday, at Hamilton, a drunken row occurred in J. Phillips' saloon on James street. The proprietor sent his little girl for a policeman, but Wm. Holloran, one of the gang, stopped her. Phillips interfered, and a struggle took place between them, and Phillips, in defending himself, struck Holloran so severe a blow that it is feared it will prove fatal. Phillips gave himself up to the police, and Holloran was taken to a doctor's.

At Osgoode Hall, Toronto, on Friday, Mr. Hugh McMillan, Q. C., applied to Mr. Justice O'Leary for an order to admit to bail James and William Feebley, who are at present confined in London gaol, and against whom indictments were found, the first for the murder of John and Thomas Donnelly at Lucan, and the second named for the murder of Thos. Donnelly alone. The order was granted with the consent of the Crown counsel, represented by the Deputy Attorney-General, permitting to be held in the sum of \$2,000 each on each of the indictments, and two sureties of \$1,000 each, to stand their trial at the next spring assizes. As to Wm. Feebley the inquiry as to the sufficiency of the bail shall be as if only one recognizance had been entered into.
